Art	seating, tables, reflective space	looms and weaving, plantable paper, wreaths and decor, natural dyes and paints, cordage, printmaking (leaf rubbings, veggie stamps, flower pounding), gourd and seed instruments, seed mosaics, nature mandalas, signs & murals
Bird	 diversity of plants for food and shelter for seeds: sunflowers, coneflowers for nectar: bee balm, cardinal flower trees and shrubs with fruits, nuts, sap water source 	STEM (habitats, ecosystems); bird feeders/houses
Book	 grow plants that appear in books like Jack and the Beanstalk, Tops and Bottoms, Peter Rabbit, or Seedfolks seating, shade, free little library 	ELA

Music	gourds, plants with seed pods, lesser quaking grass, money plant, plants and infrastructure that attract birds	Music - shakers, chimes, bird houses and feeders
Plant Parts	roots (carrots), stems (celery), leaves (lettuce), flowers (broccoli), fruit (tomatoes), seeds (sunflowers)	STEM
Pollinator	 native plants - cardinal flower, bee balm variety of shapes, sizes, colors, bloom times wild spaces for overwintering insects - grasses, weeds, wildflowers nectar and pollen-rich flowers for butterfly larvae: carrot, dill, fennel, parsley, milkweed for bees and wasps: zinnia, mint, phlox for hummingbirds: nasturtium, sage water source 	STEM - interdependence, observation skills, environmental stewardship, life cycles
Rain	 cardinal flower, orange coneflower, sensitive fern, southern blue flag iris link: <u>Grow Native!</u> 	STEM - adaptations, ecosystems
Recipe	salad (lettuce, radish, peas, carrots), salsa (peppers, tomatillos, garlic, onion), pickle (any veggie), pizza (herbs, tomatoes)	Nutrition
Seed Saver	wild indigo, allium, marigolds, sunflowers, milkweed, scarlet runner beans, dandelion	STEM - adaptations, life cycles
