School & Youth Garden Services

On-Site Youth Garden Lessons

Our youth garden lessons promote outdoor learning through guided exploration, the development of observation skills, and exposure to the fundamentals of growing food. This service is open to PreK through 12th-grade students in the Seed St. Louis service area. Schools must have a garden or green space to apply.

Seed St. Louis offers a "Seed to STEM" curriculum for grades K-5. This program emphasizes life science topics and builds connections between nature, food, and the school community. Curriculum aligns with NGSS and MySci Lessons; lesson plans and accompanying journal pages are available online.

Seedling Sales

Seed St. Louis holds three seedling sales in spring, summer, and fall. There are also three additional sales at the beginning and end of the growing season. Our March sale includes seed potatoes, onions, and more. Our Garlic and Shallots sale is in October. At our summer sale, we also sell sweet potato slips.

Seed Packets

Seed St. Louis sells seed packets at discounted prices through our online store. Vegetable, herb, and flower seed packets are available for \$0.25. We also offer a specially selected variety of seeds that have been tested and grow well in our climate for \$1.50.

The Seed St. Louis store sells recommended Seed St. Louis products, including organic sprays, powders, traps, insect netting, row covers, and select seeds. Limb spreaders and trunk wraps for orchard trees are also available for purchase. All orders are for in-person pickup only.

Volunteers

STLVolunteer.org, a free platform powered by the United Way of Greater St. Louis Volunteer Center, allows organizations to promote and recruit volunteers. Volunteer opportunities can range from one-time to long-term, family-friendly to board service, and from an individual to a group of 50+ people. There are eligibility criteria that must be met in order to participate. Most gardens should fit under this criteria: "Organizations comprised entirely of volunteers, that exist for charitable purposes or for mutual support who have not filed for tax exemption because they do not generate revenue, may be considered as Partners on a case-by-case basis." Compost & Mulch

Compost and wood mulch are available for free pick-up to any city resident, courtesy of St. Louis City's Forestry Division, at the following locations:

- Bell & Vandeventer, Ward 18 - Next to the Gateway Greening Demonstration Garden
- 9th & Barton, Ward 7
- Geyer & Ohio, Ward 6 - On Geyer, west of Ohio
- Chippewa & Oregon, Ward 20 - NE corner
- Park & Dolman, Ward 6 - On Dolman, south of Park
- Carondelet Park, Ward 13 - East end of the park off Holly Hills and west of the YMCA
- Hickory Park, Ward 2 - Conduit Drive

St. Louis City's Forestry Division will deliver compost, mulch, and tree stumps to St. Louis City school gardens. To schedule a delivery for your school garden, please call (314) 613-7200.

Mulch can also be requested through the website chipdrop.com. This mulch comes from tree trimming companies. They will also often happily deliver locally produced mulch that works great in the garden if you contact them directly.

Other Garden Supplies

Burlap Sacks: Free, used burlap coffee sacks that can be used for weed suppression are available from Ronnoco Coffee Company Fridays at noon at their dock. Phone: (314) 371-5050, Address: 318 S. Boyle Ave, St. Louis, MO, 63110

Native Trees: Forest ReLeaf distributes native trees through their CommuniTree program. This

program is available for public or nonprofit plantings (neighborhood associations, schools, Scouts, churches, cities, municipalities and other community groups) in Missouri and surrounding communities. <https://moreleaf.org/project-communitree/>

Native Plants: Brightside STL distributes native plants through their Neighbors Naturescaping program to public groups (nonprofits, neighborhood associations, community groups and school groups) located within St. Louis city limits.
